Concord Prison Outreach, a Hancock mission partner, was founded in 1968 to provide volunteer support in a local prison infirmary. Since then, it has grown into the largest organization of its kind in the state and a national model, committed to

helping people who are incarcerated build better lives for themselves and their families. Serving eight prisons and one jail, through the services of hundreds of volunteers they offer educational programs that focus on skill-building and personal growth, essentials in helping people in prison to achieve success post-incarceration.

Come learn about Concord Prison Outreach after morning worship on today, in the Kathie Stuart Room. Kaia Stern, their executive director since 2015, will speak about what CPO does and how it is improving people's lives. Kaia is an educator, speaker, and consultant whose work focuses on transformative justice. In 2008, Kaia cofounded the Prison Studies Project at Harvard, and her book, *Voices from American Prisons: Faith, Education and Healing*, was published in 2014. Ordained as an interfaith minister, Kaia holds a master's of theological studies from Harvard Divinity School and a doctorate in religion from Emory University.

CITY MISSION COAT BOSTON EVENT

GBIO HEALTHCARE ACTION MEETING NOVEMBER 4TH AT 7PM



The Greater Boston Interfaith Organization (GBIO) Healthcare Action Meeting has been scheduled for Monday, November 4th at 7 PM at the IBEW Local 103, 256 Freeport St, Boston. This meeting will include Senate President Karen Spilka, Senate Co-chair of Health Finance Committee Cindy Friedman and Secretary of Health and Human Services Marylou Sudders. This meeting follows the very successful Teach-In on September 5th which included almost estimated 300 GBIO participants to further define the Healthcare Legislative Reform agenda that addresses:

Lowering Prescription Drug Cost through transparency and accountability on large drug companies.

Mental Health Parity: This encompasses many issues, and GBIO's health care team is still learning—from its research and consulting with our members—what our specific priorities will be.

Lowering Out-of-Pocket Costs: This also encompasses many issues, which GBIO will further focus in the months ahead.

This is a significant step in GBIO's year-long campaign to improve Healthcare in Massachusetts and your attendance is urgently needed!

MOMENT FOR REFLECTION

This morning we reflect on the second of our congregation's mission goals: to walk our spiritual paths together. In keeping with our Congregational tradition, we have a high regard for each individual to choose his or her own path. We believe that it is for freedom that we have been made free, and we respect the discernment of each conscience. And yet we are also aware of the limits of individuality. Often we need help to see truths that are invisible to us where we stand. Often our bad habits merely reinforce each other, and impede our growth. Often we simply fall short of what we need, and must rely on the presence and witness of others. And so, because both of these things are true, we walk spiritual paths of our own choosing, but we do so in community with others. And we are strengthened by the community for the tasks of taking responsibility for our own lives. Our individual freedom is best nurtured in community with others who are similarly free. No one ever better articulated this relationship of free individual in the bonds of community than the apostle Paul, and today's reading from his first letter to the Corinthians is a perfect expression of what will make it possible for us to fulfill our mission goal of walking our spiritual paths together.
